Executive Summary

A design that embraces and enhances the unique identity and character of Dickson shops, through a series of interventions that celebrate and promote the eclectic nature of each space and providing inbuilt flexibility for new opportunities.

The Preliminary Sketch Plan design for Dickson Shops has been developed in direct response to community feedback.

It brings together the wants, and needs of a diverse and growing community by balancing the strong desire to protect and retain the character that the community holds dear, whilst providing much needed upgrades and improvements to the public realm to support a range of new functions and uses into the future.

Dickson shops is a series of unique spaces interconnected by laneways or 'corridors'. The proposed design aims to improve the perception of safety within the precinct, provide a sense of legibility and consistency, whilst providing a diversity of experiences for the public and community members.


This design thinking is captured through the 'Dickson Neighbourhood' concept. The 'Neighbourhood' looks to embed a sense of familiarity and comfort within the design proposal, whilst repositioning Dickson Shops into a new stage of its evolution.


To ensure the uniqueness of Dickson is represented, specific elements such as artworks and materiality have been retained and re-purposed within the design proposition. The proposal draws on cues from the Dickson Heritage Library, designed by Enrico Taglietti, ensuring the proposed landscape design integrates seamlessly with this iconic building and its immediate context.


Movement, comfort and amenity is expressed through the rationalisation of pedestrian pathways, increased canopy coverage, and opportunities for respite and refuge throughout. The proposed design also addresses:


- + Site specific conditions, including past flooding issues, safety and accessibility.
- + Rest points along paths.
- + A space for youths within the adjacent park.
- + Opportunities for outdoor dining.
- + Opportunities for community exchange and small scale markets.
- + A square that honours the heritage significance of the Dickson Library, providing public gathering and event opportunities.
- + The need to maintain large trees in raised planter beds, and increase tree canopy coverage.
- + The need to maintain the existing number of car parking spaces, including loading zones, accessible parking, and 5 minute drop off zones.
- + Maintain the existing number of bicycle parks.





















































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
