

SUMMARY **DRAFT CITY PLAN**

Update to the City Plan 2014

**The vision for the Draft City Plan is:
A fair place for all. A vital and energetic place for people to
enjoy and meet. A place that is community focussed, walkable,
public transport-oriented, sustainable, resilient and connected
to its landscape.**

The Draft City Plan is based on people. It provides a vision and framework for how land use and development can make the City Centre a better place for residents, visitors and business people. It provides clear direction for future growth so the City Centre remains Canberra's cultural and economic hub servicing the ACT's current and growing population.

How do the City Plan and City Centre Urban Design Framework fit in the planning system?

The Draft City Plan and urban design framework have been prepared in the context of the current reforms to the planning system. They sit alongside the draft Inner North and City District Strategy. In recognition of the regional and national role of the City Centre, the draft plan has more detailed direction than the district strategies. Where appropriate, the

plan's policy positions will be reflected in the desired policy outcomes of the Territory Plan. The urban design framework's design guidance will support the assessment provisions of the Territory Plan for development projects in the City Centre.

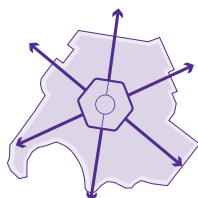

Strategic Goals

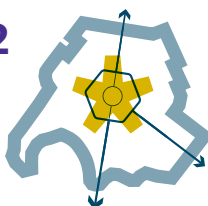
The eight strategic goals below shaped the development of the plan and the draft spatial framework (the map on page 4).

A City Centre that is our gateway to the world and the cosmopolitan heart of Canberra with a clear sense of arrival and more destinations for people to visit, linger and interact.

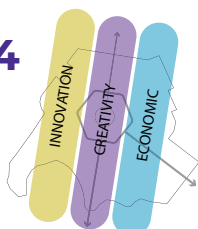
An identifiable approach route, which increases in formality on approach to the City Centre and which clearly signifies the symbolic and functional roles of the National Capital.

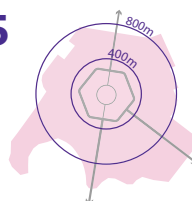
An easy-to-access, people-first destination that offers unique business opportunities and a wide range of lifestyle options for diverse communities and a distinct urban culture.

A place-based approach to development and urban renewal with a strong focus on design excellence, providing a diversity of housing choices, sustainability and innovation.

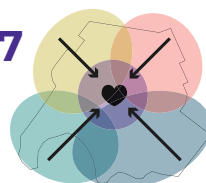
A public transport supportive urban environment that balances movement and place with significant provision and priority for pedestrians, cyclists, and public transport users.

A biodiverse urban environment with generous planting on buildings, the public realm, streets and open spaces that create memorable places to support public life.

A unified City Centre, comprised of five precincts each with their own unique character, united as the heart of Canberra.

A City Centre that is a contemporary expression of the Griffin plan's structure by strengthening the geometry and form of main avenues, vistas and public spaces.

Implementation

Numerous city-shaping projects have been delivered. Others, including those listed below, are currently underway or are being planned. These projects are essential catalysts for change within the City Centre that will breathe new life into our city's heart:

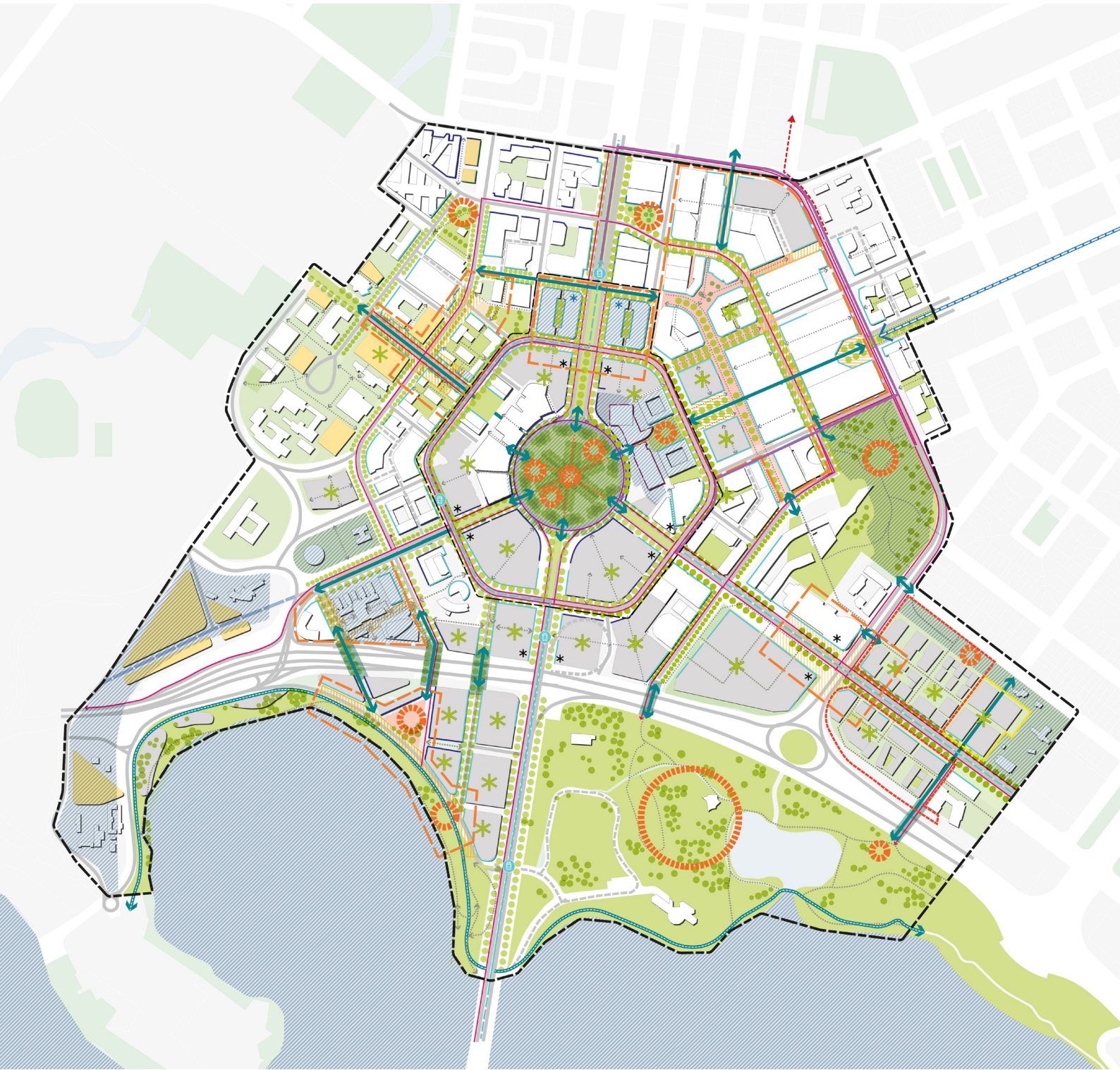
- Raising of London Circuit and Light Rail Stage 2A
- Redevelopment of Acton Waterfront
- Revitalisation of Civic Square and Canberra Theatre Centre into an arts and cultural district

- Establishment of a city entertainment precinct
- Establishment of University of NSW campus

The plan outlines another 21 actions needed to realise the vision and strategic goals of the Draft City Plan. These actions are draft only and subject to government agreement and community consultation.

What the City Centre could look like

The draft spatial framework (the map) shows what the City Centre could look like, with the five precincts each having their own character but working together to become one unified City Centre. Does this spatial framework meet your aspirations? What else could we look at?

DRAFT CANBERRA CITY URBAN DESIGN FRAMEWORK



The Draft Canberra City Urban Design Framework shows in detail how we can bring the high-level City Plan to life in a co-ordinated, holistic way with excellent design outcomes.

The urban design framework is about making a better City Centre that meets the aspirations and needs of all Canberrans. It provides key directions and recommendations for achieving high quality urban design outcomes to reinvigorate and rejuvenate the City Centre for the city's residents and reinforce its position as the heart of Canberra.

What is the urban design framework?

The urban design framework sets out how we can achieve density, design excellence, high quality buildings and great streets, public open spaces, placemaking and arts and culture. It translates the City Plan's strategic vision and key themes into a suite of supporting strategies and initiatives that will help to guide investment and change in the future.

The urban design framework looks at the City Centre as a whole then drills down to look at each precinct in detail (including its vision, character, opportunities and challenges).

It identifies priority directions to guide the future development of each precinct, and design objectives to guide how the priority directions may be considered. It identifies key streets, sites and projects that are key to success.

It builds on previous work, plans and strategies undertaken for the City Centre to encourage investment to create a place where more people want to live, work, visit and invest.



Canberra's City Centre is made up of five distinct precincts:

1. City Hill
2. City North-East
3. City North-West
4. City South-East
5. West Basin and Acton Waterfront

What is good urban design

Good urban design is about much more than just what a place looks like; it is about how a place functions, and how it makes people feel. Good urban design supports economic, environmental, social and cultural benefits.

A place-based approach

The City Centre and its precincts each have a unique combination of people, heritage, arts and culture, built form and natural features that create places with distinctive identities and functions.

By taking a place-based approach, urban design will build on these characteristics to create a sense of place that attracts new residents, workers, visitors, innovation and investment.

The urban design framework is guided by two overarching place-based strategies:

→ Building Canberra City Centre

→ Activating Canberra City Centre

These strategies set out, in detail, how to achieve great outcomes that will see our City Centre continue to grow and develop and retain its essential and important place in the city.

Making great precincts

Each of the five precincts has its own unique character and key active public spaces. The urban design framework refines each precinct's vision and character, as well as key opportunities and challenges for future development. It identifies priority directions to guide the future development of each precinct; these directions align with the Draft City Plan.

Furthermore, the framework has design objectives to guide how the priority directions may be considered and how more specific key moves and catalyst projects will be identified.

The framework then identifies key streets and places for each precinct to show better guidance on activation, supporting the movement and place strategy.

→ City Hill Precinct

continue to be an area of civic and cultural importance, highly active with a mix of residential, retail, commercial, and community uses.

→ City North-East

dominated by finer grain retail and commercial uses, is the primary entertainment area of Canberra with high levels of activity. City Walk, Garema Place and Petrie Plaza form an extensive area of pedestrianised streets that characterise the areas as the focus of City Centre retail and entertainment uses.

→ City South-East

tourism, business and education quarter defined by tourism and recreational uses, access to high quality parks and open spaces. Constitution Avenue is one of the most prominent connections between City Hill and the National Triangle, with high quality streetscape outcomes.

→ City North-West

mix of education, research and commercial uses, with a diverse character underpinned by students, arts and theatre communities.

→ West Basin and Acton Waterfront

a lively waterfront community with mixed activities and services that will truly make the most of Lake Burley Griffin.
